Originally, the Jolly Corks wanted to choose the African Buffalo, which was the name of an English Fraternity called the Buffalos. Others wanted an American animal, hence the Elk was selected for its peaceful and protective nature. The animal from which the Order took its name was chosen because a number of its attributes were deemed typical of those to be cultivated by members of the fraternity. The Elk is distinct fully an American animal. It habitually lives in herds.

The largest of our native quadrupeds, it is yet fleet of foot and graceful in movement. It is quick and keen of perception, and while it is usual gentle and even timorous, it is strong and valiant in defense of its own. A representation of the majestic head of the male, with its spreading antlers, was adopted as the first badge of the Order, and is still the most conspicuous element of its copyrighted, fraternal emblem.

When Elks give the hailing sign, by bringing the hands in one circular movement to a position over the head, palms to the front, it denotes the spreading antlers of an Elk. We also great or new members at the end of their initiation, by giving the hailing sign and saying "with the spreading antlers of Protection".

The hailing sign is given only in front of the Alter in the Lodge Room, while the Lodge is in session or when ordered by the Exalted Ruler. Additionally, when asking to retire when the Lodge is in session, proceed to the Alter, face the Exalted Ruler or the Leading Knight and give the hailing sign. When returning while the Lodge is in session, the same is done. At all times, when the hailing sign is given, it is to be held until the Exalted Ruler or Leading Knight gives the wave of the arm.

This a tradition of all Elks and is emphasized in the Initiation Ritual and should be revered by all Elks.

As Paul Harvey said, "Now You Know the Rest of the Story".

The Elks Most Valuable Student (MVS) Scholarship is now open for High School Seniors to apply for on the Elks Website. Eligibility:

- 4. Applicants must be citizens of the United States on the date their applications are submitted; permanent legal resident status does not qualify.

Without all of you, we would have not been successful, nor would we have additional opportunities to continue building those relationships, and our Lodge would not be receiving roughly \$3,000.00; from the Posse this week.

The Posse was so pleaseed with us they now are asking us to join forces with them and assist on a wide variety of other events that will continue to provide profits to us and possibly stash some away for a new building!

YES! You read correctly.

2nd:

As some of you may be aware, Our Lodge was shut down from July 25th to August 5th due to unforeseen plumbing issues in the kitchen. I'm pleased to announce we are fully operational and open for business!

However, the issue that caused this was old, cracked cast iron pipes. While we were able to make the repairs in the kitchen it was also discovered we had a ticking time bomb of another cast iron pipeline that runs from the bar through the dining room and would have cost an additional \$12,000.00 and we could have been closed for a minimum of another 3 weeks to a month. In addition to being closed, and the cost for the repairs, we would also have the cost of the repairs to make our Lodge whole again once the plumbing work was completed.

Therefore, given the Eugene Lodge was never meant to stay at the current location and we have nearly \$200,000.00 in needed repairs the Board held an emergency meeting, and the decision was clear, we need to find a new home. We understand this process may take up to 2 years, but as your Exalted Ruler, I will be looking for individuals to form a Building Committee as quickly as possible.

Oregon Elks Children's Eye Clinic Visit


The Oregon Elks Children's Eye Clinic located in Portland OR is a very special place. In addition to protecting, restoring, and maintaining children and adults' eyesight, the institute gifts every child who has surgery at the facility, a quilt before they are discharged. The received approximately 1,900 quilts last year alone and the majority of the donations come from various Oregon lodges.

One of our members, Donna Gregersen heard of their generosity and wanted to make some quilts to donated to their cause. She had much of the material already but needed more to finish the project. At one of the lodge meetings Donna took up a donation, and weeks later, she brought 10 finished quilts to the lodge to be delivered to the Portland facility.

At the end of May, Stephen and Diane McKinley, who currently serve as Trustees at the Lodge, drove to Portland to do just that. Once there, they met with Bethany Lang, Sr. Community Research Liaison to Deliver 10 beautiful quilts, 9 child size and 1 teenage size quilts.
